

DAYTON INTERNATIONAL FESTIVAL, INC.
RULES FOR KITCHEN USE

1. Kitchen badges must be worn at all times when in the kitchen.
2. Only two persons from each member organization are allowed in the kitchen at any one time. If using the kitchen for food preparation, additional persons may be allowed with pre-approval.
3. No children are allowed in the kitchen.
4. No food may be brought in before Friday morning at 10:00 a.m.
5. Only enough food for one day may be brought into the kitchen each day.
6. Leftovers are not to be refrigerated and reheated the next day. Leftovers must be disposed of.
7. If using the stoves for frying or cooking with oil, you have the option of having the oil provided by the Convention Center. This is recommended since it is usually cheaper and easier to handle. There will be an additional charge which must be paid separately (not through DIFI). Let the DIFI Kitchen Supervisor know if you want to do this.
8. Disposal of cooking grease must be done by kitchen staff
9. Clean up after yourself.
10. Do not use any items that belong to the Dayton Convention Center.
11. Be considerate of others and don't take more space than you need.
12. Mark all food items stored in the cooler. Shelves are labeled, but items (especially on the floor) may be confused by others using the kitchen.
13. Please mark all cookware and utensils with the name of your member organization or the country/ethnic group you are representing. (Many items are picked up by mistake at the end of the festival.)
14. Make sure all items brought in are removed at the close of the festival. The Dayton Convention Center is not responsible for items left after Sunday night.
15. The DIFI Kitchen Supervisor(s) and the Dayton Convention Center representative(s) are in charge and their direction must be followed. Infractions will be reported to the Ethics Committee.
16. For those cooking in the kitchen, you will also be charged for food prep and dishwashing, even if you didn't mark those items on the form. Likewise, you will not be charged for water use since it is implied in the cooking process.
